We hope this letter finds you well.

Attached is a statement signed by over forty Jewish organizations, including most of the members of the Conference of Presidents. The concerns and sentiments raised in the statement are widely held in the American Jewish community as well as by Iraqi Jews around the world. We are more than grateful for the extraordinary role and commitment of the U.S. government in enabling the rescue and restoration of this archive that otherwise would have been lost in the flooded basement of the Iraqi Intelligence building. NARA played a remarkable role and continues to work to preserve and digitize the collection.

We hope you will consider the points enumerated in the attached statement. Specifically, these items were taken by previous Iraqi regimes from Jewish individuals and communities who were forced to flee their native country and today their interests are represented by communal bodies like the World Organization of Jews from Iraq. The long term care of this archive and its accessibility must be assured. There are precedents of countries providing sacred ritual objects and Torah scrolls to expatriate Jewish communities. Lithuania, the Czech Republic, and Uzbekistan all made available religious artifacts, texts, and scrolls for use by Jewish communities around the world.

The sensitivity and understanding demonstrated until now should guide any further action and assure the sacredness and accessibility of these items that reflect the history, and belong to the patrimony, of Iraq's former Jewish citizens.

Statement by Jewish Organizations on Iraqi Jewish Archives

In 2003 a vast collection of books, documents, community records and Torah scrolls fragments was discovered in the basement of the Iraqi Security Ministry. Originally looted from the Iraqi Jewish community these items were in danger of being destroyed due to flooding in the building. With the intercession of the US government and experts from the National Archives (NARA) this entire collection, which has come to be known as the Iraqi Jewish Archives (IJA), was brought to the United States.

In the intervening years the IJA has been carefully catalogued and restored by NARA, and all important items are being scanned and digitized and will ultimately be accessible via the Internet. An exhibition has been organized by NARA which will use some of the items to tell the account of their rescue and the larger story of the history of Jews in Iraq, where today only a handful still reside. This exhibition will open in November in Washington at the National Archives and then travel to New York to be exhibited at the Museum of Jewish Heritage. The US Government has indicated that the IJA will then be sent back to Iraq in the spring of 2014 based on a decade old agreement between NARA and the coalition provisional authority (CPA).

We are grateful for the rescue of the Iraqi Jewish Archives and for the restoration work that has been carried out by NARA. We look forward to the exhibition that will soon open. But we are deeply troubled by the prospect that at the end of this long journey the US government plans to return all of these items to Iraq. It is important to enumerate several key points:

- These items were looted by the Baath regime in the 1970s and 1980s from Jewish individuals and communal institutions synagogues, schools, etc. Since virtually all of Iraqi Jewry from this millennia-old community have been displaced, their claims today are represented by international communal organizations such as the World Organization of Jews from Iraq.
- The Iraqi Jewish Archives must be maintained in a place where their long-term preservation and care can be guaranteed.
- They should be housed in a location that is accessible to scholars and to Iraqi Jews and their descendants who have communal and historic interest and personal ties to them.

Further, we draw attention to the fact that there are still in Iraq many other possessions of the Jewish community including Torah scrolls. These scrolls should be returned to synagogue use and transferred to congregations of Iraqi Jews in America and elsewhere rather than remain in storage and remain in storage in inappropriate conditions in Iraq.

There are recent precedents when countries such as Lithuania and the Czech Republic, returned sacred Jewish items, including Torahs, to expatriate countries abroad.

In light of this, we believe that it would be inappropriate to return the Iraqi Jewish Archives to Iraq next year. Instead, we urge Secretary of State John Kerry, to consult with representatives of

the Iraqi Jewish diaspora and government of Iraq, to ensure that these fundamental concerns will be addressed before any action is taken.
